Jane believes it is an important opportunity that allows young people to explore career pathways and make informed decisions about their future.

"I also had work experience in retail, carpentry, sheet metal work and window manufacturing - all incredibly valuable experiences," said Ms Hanan.

"Work experience provides young people with exposure to different industries, increasing their knowledge and opening their eyes to opportunities outside their horizons.

"It teaches them useful skills which they can apply throughout the rest of their lives," said Ms Hanan.

Each year in Cairns over 1,000 students and school leavers participate in work experience. Local businesses who can provide young people with access to work experience opportunities are encouraged to contact VPG to learn more about the program.

YOUTH RECRUITMENT BOOM

Local entrepreneur, Daniel Freebody owner of Car Wash Café, Northern Detailers and Meldrum's Pies recruits five VPG participants to support business boom.

Working in partnership with VPG, Mr Freebody relies on the recruitment service to secure motivated talent prepared for the workforce.

"Working conditions at the carwash can be quite labour intensive, and VPG is able to refer really good candidates who understand what is expected from them before they get here, making the recruitment process simple and easy," said Mr Freebody. VPG Career and Transitions Officer Wendy Sike supported Mr Freebody through the hiring blitz to identify suitable candidates.

"Every job vacancy has requirements and having worked closely with Daniel to understand the working conditions, I am able to match a young persons' strengths and aspirations with what the business is looking for," said Ms Sike.

The new recruits have successfully transitioned into employment with Carwash Cafe, and will continue to receive ongoing post-placement support to maximise employment success in the workplace.



IGNITING A NEWFOUND PASSION



Playing rugby league at a professional level, James endured extensive injuries driving him to reflect on his career aspirations and explore alternative employment pathways through VPG's Transition to Work (TtW) program.

With career counselling, James identified an interest in getting a trade and was supported with all aspects of his job search

Living in a Innisfail, James was connected and updated with local vacancies via a digital jobs board distributed by VPG detailing opportunities that aligned to his aspirations.

Advertised was a labourer position with local construction company, Sinton Constructions, and James was encouraged to apply. Successful in his application, he was offered a one-day work trial where his skills and talents were quickly recognised, resulting in secured employment.

Marc Sinton, the employer, accessed support from VPG to navigate wage subsidies and incentives attached to James' employment, and within two weeks, James was offered a carpentry apprenticeship.

Receiving on-the-job training, James is learning new skills and gaining valuable industry knowledge and experience. Marc has praised James' reliability, work ethic and positive attitude and hopes that he will sustain long term employment with the company beyond his apprenticeship years.

Participating in TtW has inspired employment aspirations outside James' football ambitions, providing an opportunity to create and achieve a fulfilling future.

"Doing this line of work and knowing I can do it for the rest of my life, with a good pay check, is a future for me," said VPG Participant James.





LEARNER DRIVER PROGRAM SET **FO MAXIMISE EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES** OR YOUTH

Recognising the increasing demand for employees to hold a driver license, VPG has joined forces with Cairns Truck Schools to deliver a Learner Driver Program providing young jobseekers access to funded driving lessons.

VPG Partnerships Officer Jacinta Perry said the program is opening employment opportunities for local youth.

"The Learner Driver Program provides jobseekers engaged in VPG's youth transition programs an opportunity to access supervised driving lessons so they can work towards achieving their provisional licence.

"To date we have supported 55 young people with over 275 hours of funded lessons, and as a result our participants are successfully securing job opportunities that require a licence, or that would remain inaccessible without independent travel by car," said Ms Perry.

Providing young people opportunities within the automotive industry, Managing Director at Cairns Diesel Services, Travis Briffa, said the program allowed him to secure motivated talent who can fulfil their recruitment needs.

"We were recruiting for an entry level position suited to a young person looking to gain mechanical experience, and obviously having a driver license in this line of work is a must," said Mr Briffa.

"VPG put forward some great candidates, and we chose 19-year-old Darnell based on his attitude and willingness to learn.

"Darnell was working towards his P's and knowing VPG was going to continue supporting him with lessons once he started with us, was reassuring and gave us the confidence in our staffing choice.

"Young people have to start somewhere, and this opportunity definitely helped Darnell get his foot in the door," said Mr Briffa.
